## THE PRESIDENT'S PIECE

Welcome to all members and readers of the June edition of the AEME/RAEME Association of South Australia Inc. Newsletter. I trust you are all prepared to ward off the wogs that winter brings with it.

This year saw the 62<sup>nd</sup> Anniversary of the first bombing of Darwin and to mark the occasion the Darwin Defenders 1942-45 Inc. held a Commemoration Service at the State National War Memorial on 19 February (commemorations are held annually on or about 19 February). My school Australian history certainly did nothing to enlighten me as to what happened in our own country back in 1942. Reading the fact sheet of the 64 bombing raids on Darwin 1942-43, I see two air raids were made on the civil drome and Katherine drome. I never knew that war came 200 miles inland. ## 2004 RAEME "SOLDIER OF THE YEAR" CENTRAL REGION

Last year the Association initiated an award to the best ARA "RAEME Soldier of the Year" and the best GRes "RAEME Soldier of the Year" in Central Region. This is a separate award from the annual "RAEME Craftsman of the Year" award because that award is restricted to the rank of Craftsman and excludes the ranks of Lance Corporal and Corporal.

The award consists of a personal trophy for each recipient and a perpetual plaque that is held by the recipient's unit. All RAEME soldiers in South Australia, including Broken Hill, are eligible for nomination and candidates will be assessed on trade skills and soldier skills.

#### ROMAN WAR HORSES, TRAINS AND SPACE SHIPS

Does the statement "We've always done it that way" ring any bells? The US standard railroad gauge (distance between the rails) is 4 feet, 8.5 inches.

That's an exceedingly odd number. Why was that gauge used? Because that's the way they built them in England, and English expatriates built the US Railroads.

Why did the English build them like that? Because the first rail lines were built by the same people who built the pre-railroad tramways, and that's the gauge they used.

Why did "they" use that gauge then? Because the people who built the tramways used the same jigs and tools that they used for building wagons, which used that wheel spacing.

Okay! Why did the wagons have that particular odd wheel spacing? Well, if they tried to use any other spacing, the wagon wheels would break on some of the old, long distance roads in England, because that's the spacing of the wheel ruts.

So who built those old rutted roads? Imperial Rome built the first long distance roads in Europe (and England) for their legions. The roads have been used ever since.

And the ruts in the roads? Roman war chariots formed the initial ruts, which everyone else had to match for fear of destroying their wagon wheels. Since the chariots were made for Imperial Rome, they were all alike in the matter of wheel spacing.

The United States standard railroad gauge of 4 feet, 8.5 inches is derived from the original specifications for an Imperial Roman war chariot. Thus, bureaucracies live forever.

So the next time you are handed a spec and told we have always done it that way and wonder what horse's a\*se came up with that, you may be exactly right, because the Imperial Roman war chariots were made just wide enough to accommodate the back ends of two war horses.

Now the twist to the story...

When you see a Space Shuttle sitting on its launch pad, there are two big booster rockets attached to the sides of the main fuel tank. These are solid rocket boosters, or SRBs. The SRBs are made by Thiokol at their factory in Utah. The engineers who designed the SRBs would have preferred to make them a bit fatter, but the SRBs had to be shipped by train from the factory to the launch site. The railroad line from the factory happens to run through a tunnel in the mountains. The SRBs had to fit through that tunnel. The tunnel is slightly wider than the railroad track, and the railroad track, as you now know, is about as wide as two horses' behinds. So, a major Space Shuttle design feature of what is arguably the world's most advanced transportation system was determined over two thousand years ago by the width of two horse's a\*ses.

And you thought being a horse's a\*se wasn't important!!

## FORT LARGS GUNS RESTORATION

The April Work Party reinstalled the bottom pulley of the Ammo Lift of the southern Gun, however the pulley housing cracked when the chain was reinstalled. Robin Maslen arranged for the crack to be repaired (thanks once again, Robin).

The June Work Party was well attended. This allowed the pulley housing to be reinstalled while the southern Gun was cleaned with a high pressure water gun. Work also started on rehanging some of the wooden doors on the upper level.

Each Gun is greased and fully exercised at each Work Party. Most mechanisms now operate reasonably freely, however the traversing mechanisms are the main problem. The northern Gun will traverse with the handwheel, however it needs help by pushing on the barrel to get it going. On the other hand the southern Gun, despite all our efforts, will only traverse with the aid of a winch. It appears unlikely that this situation will improve without actually lifting the Guns clear of their pedestals, which is beyond our capability.

We intend to clean the northern Gun with the high pressure water gun at the next Work Party on Saturday 7 August. We will also grease and exercise all mechanisms on both guns. All members are most welcome to drop in for a chat. In case of inclement weather you can check with me, Keith Tainsh, on phone (08) 8326 2581 to see if it has been postponed.

## **ANZAC REPORT 2004**

## 107 RAEME WORKSHOP TO THE RESCUE

In February this year workshop personnel at the request of Bruce Watson and the Moonta



branch of the National Trust, recovered an old World War 1 German Field Gun from its resting place at the Moonta Mines Museum to the workshops in Warradale where volunteers will work to restore and return it to Moonta.

The gun is believed to have been captured by "A Corps" some time during World War 1 and became part of the official war trophies and subsequently allocated to South Australia. The gun, arriving by train, was presented to the town of Moonta in June 1921.

I searched the Internet and located a great website on German Field Guns (www.landships.freeservers.com) and its Webmaster Peter Kempf. Detailed photos of all parts of the gun are shown on this web page.

Peter has identified the gun as a German 105mm leichte Feldhaubitze 16 (IFH 16 light Field Howitzer model 16) introduced into the field in 1917 and designed mostly by Rheinmetall. It replaced an older light howitzer the IFH 98/09 with a longer barrel and a new breech. It fired the same ammo but was also able to fire a Gas shell.

107 Field Workshop personnel and members of the AEME/RAEME Association will work together with support from 9<sup>th</sup> Combat Service Support Battalion over the next year to try and restore the gun as near as possible to its original condition. The National Trust will be contributing to the cost of the restoration.

## PROTECTING THE UNIQUE MEANING OF ANZAC

Minister for Veterans' Affairs, Danna Vale, said she recognised the importance of the word 'Anzac' to the veteran and wider Australian community and supported the Victorian RSL in their views on the use of the word as a child's name.

The Protection of Word 'Anzac' Regulations were created in 1921, in recognition of the importance of the word to Australians and the deep and enduring interest of the ex-service and wider community in ensuring that it is not used inappropriately. The Regulations prohibit, without the authority of the Minister for Veterans' Affairs, the use of the word 'Anzac' or any similar word for any commercial purpose. There are also restrictions on the use of the word 'Anzac' in the name of streets, roads or parks.

The Regulations do not prohibit the naming of a person as 'Anzac', and it is understood that after World War 1, in the spirit of the times, there were instances of children given the name 'Anzac'. Over the passage of time, views have changed, and I would encourage the family to consider the concerns of the ex-service community on the use of 'Anzac' as a child's name.

# MEDAL TO RECOGNISE SERVICE IN DEFENCE OF AUSTRALIA

The Howard Government has today announced the intention to establish a new medal that recognises volunteer service in the Australian Defence Force. All relevant approvals are now being sought to allow the award of this medal.

The Minister Assisting the Minister for Defence, Mal Brough, said those who had served for a total of six years in the Australian Defence Force, regular or reserve, would be eligible and the medal would be backdated to recognise past service.

"The Australian Defence Medal also reflects the fact that when serving in a modern Defence Force, it becomes difficult to discriminate between those who serve directly on operations and those who support those operations. The Australian Defence Medal reflects the fact that by serving in the Australian Defence Force individuals make a contribution to the national interest, whether they served the country on operations, or whether they remained in Australia in a support role. The war on terrorism has redefined the notions of a frontline or even an easily definable Area of Operations. Some tasks undertaken by soldiers, sailors and airmen remain invisible to the community at large but are very important to our nation's defence. These may include preparation and planning, intelligence and, indeed, other classified activities that for national security reasons can't be recognised by a specific award. The Australian Defence Medal will recognise all of these circumstances of service."

Mr Brough said the Australian Defence Medal would be retrospective from the end of World War Two, in order to recognise that many people in the past had served their nation in a variety of forms, sometimes arduous, but had not been recognised by an operational medal. However, those who completed National Service would not be eligible unless they subsequently volunteered and completed the requisite six years volunteer service.

"Six years reflects a length of time that we could be reasonably certain that most people would have completed the requisite training and experience in the Regular or Reserve forces, to be considered fully deployable should they have been called upon," Mr Brough said. "We believe these conditions also give effect to a motion from the Returned and Services League who agree with our desire to further recognise ADF service. The implementation of the medal will be a significant undertaking and the issue of medals to past servicemen will take time. It is estimated that up to 400,000 ex-servicemen and women may apply for this medal," Mr Brough said. "It is anticipated that once a design has been finalised and the medals have been struck, the issuing of medals could begin around middle of 2005. Operational and other demanding overseas service will still be recognised under the current arrangements. Processing and issuing of operational awards will take priority as the new Australian Defence Medal is being implemented. Nonetheless, the Australian Defence Medal provides the Government and the Australian people the ability to recognise those service men and women who do volunteer and serve the flag in a variety of roles and are prepared, should the call come, to put their lives on the line," Mr Brough said.

## 9CSSB - DEPLOYMENT TO PARNKA POINT, COORONG

On the weekend 31<sup>st</sup> May - 1<sup>st</sup> June 2003, eight members of Recovery Platoon, 107<sup>th</sup> Field Workshop, 9<sup>th</sup> Combat Service Support Battalion deployed a Mack Truck, two Medium Recovery Vehicles (MRVs) and two Land Rovers to Parnka Point in the Coorong region of South Australia. The objective of the deployment was to assist Rangers from the Department of Environment and Heritage to remove wrecked civilian vehicles from the area.

The Platoon deployed at 0700hrs on Saturday morning, having completed preparations and loaded the stores and equipment earlier that morning. The early departure time was largely thanks to the efforts of WO2 Pammenter, SGT Riches and SGT Schmidtke who worked from very early in the morning to prepare stores. CPL Separovic gave a set of convoy orders prior to the Platoon leaving Warradale Barracks.

2LT Renfrey and SGT Riches met Mr Eric De Wits, a Coorong National Park Ranger at 0930hrs at Salt Creek and discussed plans for recovering the vehicles. The rest of the Platoon arrived in convoy 30 minutes later. We determined that two vehicles would be recovered from Parnka Point and that it would be possible to cross onto the beach at the Tea Tree Crossing, thus saving 26km and several hours on the round trip.

After a short halt, the Platoon departed Salt Creek at 1100hrs and commenced the 37km journey along the beach to Parnka Point. The Tea Tree Crossing was negotiated with ease despite the high tide making the water depth approximately 500mm. The going along the beach was very good for the majority of the journey, however the sand become much softer over the last 8km. One Land Rover became temporarily bogged, but was easily towed out by a MRV.

At Parnka Point, the wrecked vehicles were easily located and the Platoon began the task of hooking them up to the MRV's. The back wheels and axles of both casualties had seized and meant that the Platoon had to use oxyacetylene equipment to separate the diff and unseize the back wheels. With much banging and burning by CPL Separovic and crew the two vehicles were eventually made towable and the Platoon left for Tea Tree Crossing at 1600hrs. With the sun rapidly setting the Platoon made good going back along the Coorong beach, stopping only to collect firewood. The Platoon set up camp for the night at Tea Tree Crossing. WO2 Pammenter organised a modest size bonfire (by his standards) and SGT Riches cooked up a feast on the Company BBQ.

The Platoon rose early on Sunday morning after a rainy night under canvas and prepared to head home. The Platoon stopped at the Ranger's station at Salt Creek to drop off the two vehicles and pick up another wrecked vehicle (recovered by a 107<sup>th</sup> Field Workshop team in September 2002) which was destined for the scrap yard at Murray Bridge. We also had the advantage of cleaning the sand and salt water from the vehicles with the Ranger's high pressure cleaning equipment.

At Murray Bridge, CPL Separovic and LCPL Raymond led the operation to unload the casualty from the Mack truck. The operation was made tricky by the fact that the wreck lacked tyres on several wheels and refused to travel in a straight line. With great effort and eventual success the wrecked vehicle was safely unloaded and left with its grateful new owner at the scrap yard.

The Platoon returned to Warradale Barracks at 1600hrs on Sunday afternoon, refurbished stores and cleaned our vehicles again.

The deployment was a great success and all members had an enjoyable experience. The newer members of the Platoon gained valuable recovery and off road driving experience in challenging conditions, whilst the more experienced members of the team updated their recovery skills with the valuable refresher training. We will be actively looking to participate in similar DACC tasks in the future.

#### **CENTURION TANK**

Having read Major Paul Handel's excellent article in the RAEME Craftsman on the history of the ARV and Bill O'Niell's article on times past, I thought I would put a recent experience onto paper, which may interest the old "Tankies Labourers".

Last year my son Colin who is currently in a Sergeants position in Lavarack Barracks phoned and told me that one of his mates had an interest in the purchase of a Centurion tank. I thought to myself "why would anyone with supposedly, a normal set of thinking gear, want to go and waste that sort of money".

Colin volunteered the information that I had worked on tanks and might be able to give a bit of technical advice if called upon. Well I was called upon; during the winter months of last year, the proud new owner had decided to take the tank for a spin. He had gone over a hill crest and was angling down the hill when he decided to turn to the right up the hill again, in soft going. You guessed it; he threw the left track and all but buried the left set of road wheels. That's when I received the call.

The short story is they decided to leave the Cent where it was until the ground dried out and then try and recover it. With the assistance of some earth moving equipment and advice of some old tankies, they dug it out, ran the track back on and in the process sheared something in the LH final drive.

I was invited to a BBQ lunch on the property, coincidentally at the time they were going to have a go at removing the final drive, which against my far better judgement, I decided to accept.

They had broken the track but weren't too sure how to proceed from there. Bearing in mind that I hadn't worked on a Cent for almost 30 years, a few things started to come back; the smell for one and then that black stuff that usually hangs around in the transmission compartment when a rear main oil seal hasn't been performing up to standard.

We all know how simple it is to get the final drive ready to remove from the hull. All we need to do is disconnect the quill shaft, remove the main brake drum, shoes and backing plate, remove the final drive mounting bolts and lift the unit off. That is of course if you can push the quill shaft right into the final drive.

In my capacity as supervisor, mainly because I don't bend as well as I used to, I was amused by all of the descriptive language that was being issued by the slaves in the transmission compartment. I hadn't heard them in that context for years but not one word was original. To them maybe, but not to me.

We were a little behind schedule when we were called to the BBQ, all things being equal, we had expected to have the FD on the deck. A beer and a bit of food gave us a chance to reassess the situation and regain some of the humour that had been there at the start.

Back to work and it was decided that the complete drive (muff?) coupling had to be removed from the transmission. Of course all the straining and releasing had pushed the brake shoes from the expanders and anchors which didn't help, but finally the bloody brake drum was lifted clear and the grins of achievement from the two who had worked so hard was worth the wait.

As it was getting dark, we decided to call it a day, leaving only the brake backing plate to be removed and the slinging of the final drive to remove it.

At the time of writing the current state of repair is, the final drive has been removed and dismantled and spares have been ordered.

I've been promised an invitation when the tank is running (or maybe if they hit a problem when they are putting it all back together again). The number of the tank is 169045.

The above caused me to recall when I was Section Leader of C squadron LAD with the then Major Bruce Richards as OC, the tanks had returned to harbour, work allocated and as befitting my position, Bruce was sharing a couple of shots of B & W Scotch in return for my morning Bundy and coffee which he could sniff out at 200 paces. After a suitable time had elapsed, we decided to do the rounds and check of the progress of repairs. Hearing the sound of some exasperation we stopped, I climbed up to where a couple of "crafties" were trying to engage the quill shafts, without success. In my most confident manner I ordered them out of the way and beginning on the left side, slipped the shaft into position without effort, the same occurred to the right hand side. With all the superiority I could muster I made some comment on their lack of experience, stepped back onto the 100 gallon tank and ended up in a heap on the dirt below. I hadn't noticed that the tank had been removed.

## M1A1 ABRAMS TANK AGREEMENT SIGNED

Australia has signed a formal agreement with the United States to buy a new fleet of M1A1 Abrams tanks, Defence Minister Robert Hill announced today.

Under this agreement, the US Government will provide 59 refurbished and updated M1A1 Abrams tanks, seven M88 Hercules Armoured Recovery vehicles, advanced gunnery and driver training simulators, training and other support equipment and a range of spares. This agreement is the central component of the \$530m Abrams package which also includes tank transporters, refuelling vehicles and ammunition. Delivery of the tanks and other equipment is expected in 2007. The majority will be operated by the 1st Armoured regiment in Darwin, with a smaller allocation to be allocated to training schools.

"The M1A1 Abrams tanks will provide a major increase in capability over the present Leopard tanks, particularly with their greater firepower and their potential to operate in a modern, networked communications environment," Senator Hill said. "The new tanks will also provide our soldiers greatly increased levels of protection and survivability on the modern battlefield."

The tanks that will be provided to Australia have had relatively low usage and will be refurbished to "as new" condition. Many of their internal systems will be updated to incorporate the latest technology. This upgrade work will start soon as part of a major tank refurbishment program being undertaken for the US military's larger fleet of M1A1 tanks. A particularly innovative dimension of the project is the purchase of advanced simulators for training tank crews. This is a new direction for the Australian Army, reflecting a major increase in commitment and investment in simulation to supplement and enhance training of armoured vehicle crews.

The Abrams can reach speeds of up to 66 km/h on Australian roads and up to 48 km/h cross country with a cruising range of up to 480 kms carrying four crew and ammunition. Each tank is equipped with a 120 mm smooth bore cannon as its primary weapon and a 50 calibre machine gun for the tank commander in addition to two 7.62 mm machine guns. They are capable of firing an advanced kinetic energy Tungsten penetrator against vehicles and a multi-purpose round for infantry support. They have also been designed to provide a level of protection for soldiers from nuclear, biological or chemical threats.

#### A MODERN HEAVY RECOVERY CAPABILITY

The contract for the upgrade of the Heavy Recovery Vehicle (HRV) fleet was signed on the 18th of December 2003, with Mack Trucks Australia (MTA) by Mr Kevin O'Callaghan, PD LAND 121 and Mr Colin Partington, CEO MTA.

Currently the Army's heavy recovery capability is provided by the Truck Wrecker Heavy (TWH) which comprises a Holmes 750 Twin Boom recovery unit mounted on the inservice Mack RM6866RS cab/chassis. Whilst this vehicle provided a heavy recovery asset of acceptable capability, the Holmes recovery equipment is archaic, agricultural and exhibits severe and unacceptable occupational health and safety risks to operating personnel.

The new recovery system will totally replace the Holmes system with a Miller Industries recovery platform incorporating a Palfinger Crane, two Sepson Hydraulic winches, a hydraulic lift/tow recovery system and a commercial locker system for stowage of CES and personal items. A recovered crew cabin will be added to the vehicle to aid in transport of the disabled vehicle's crews along with modifications to reduce cabin noise and vibration. Also, upgrades to the vehicle drive train will be made to improve its capability, including increasing the vehicle's Gross Combination Mass to 110 T.

The current Schedule for delivery of the HRV into service will see the first production HRV arrive to LAND 121 around the middle of August this year. The Project Office will then put this initial vehicle through a series of acceptance tests, conducted by the Accredited Test Services, at Monegeetta. After the acceptance tests, the Commonwealth will proceed with full production and hopefully have the vehicles ready for introduction into service, early in 2005.

#### ADF SAYS GOODBYE TO 'HUEY' HELICOPTER GUNSHIPS

An important chapter in Australia's military aviation history closed today as Defence formally farewelled the UH-1H Iroquois 'Huey' Helicopter gunship at a ceremony in Brisbane, the Minister Assisting the Minister for Defence, Mal Brough said.

"The Huey has played an important part in Australia's military history and proved its value on the battlefields of Vietnam. It reinforced the importance of aviation in military operations," Mal Brough said. "There are many personnel from both the Air Force and the Army who have worked with the 'Huey' gunship over its 35 years of Australian military service. All have a profound respect for the machine and the flying and maintenance of the gunship. The Army is withdrawing the gunship element, specifically the minigun and rocket system that is attached to each side of the aircraft in preparation for introduction of the 'Aussie Tiger' Armed Reconnaissance Helicopter. The first Aussie 'Tiger' will be delivered to the Army in December this year. The Tiger will carry on the proud tradition of Defence Aviation begun by the Huey in Vietnam. The Tiger carries an extremely capable weapon system and will greatly enhance the Army's reconnaissance and strike capability."

Mal Brough was joined by Chief of the Defence Force, General Peter Cosgrove, Chief of Army, Lieutenant General Peter Leahy and Chief of Air Force, Air Marshal Angus Houston at the farewell. Air Marshal Houston, a former Iroquois pilot, flew one of the helicopters as they did a fly past over Brisbane to farewell the gunships. There are eight UH-1H modified for gunship operations. These will continue to be flown as "slick" (troop lift) aircraft. It is planned to retain the UH-1H until withdrawal from service commencing 2007 on introduction of the Troop Lift Helicopter under project Air 9000. Only the gunship element of the Iroquois and not the aircraft

itself will be retired today. With the recent return of the Black Hawk detachment from East Timor, this is the first occasion in almost six years that all of Army's Aviation elements are at home in Australia and not on operations.

The UH-1H Gunship capability was developed by the RAAF in Vietnam in 1968-69 with 9 Sqn Gunship Flight formed on 23 April 1969.
