FORT LARGS GUNS RESTORATION

The August Work Party greased and exercised all mechanisms on both Guns. The elevating mechanism on the northern Gun has freed up over time, however the slewing mechanism is still too stiff for the handwheel alone to operate and requires personnel pushing on the barrel to assist. As the handrail limits the amount of movement to an arc of 60⁰, it is intended that the October Work Party will remove the handrail and rotate the Gun 360⁰ a few times in the hope that this exercise will free it up. It is also intended to use the heat from an oxy/acetylene torch to remove the other pulley from the bottom of the Ammunition Lift of the southern Gun so that it can be cleaned up. This will make it easier to operate the Ammunition Lift.

CRAFTSMAN DOUGLAS GRAHAM BORLACE

When I arrived at 106 Field Workshop of the First Australian Task Force at Nui Dat in South Vietnam, I discovered the Other Ranks' Boozer was called the Borlace Club. Not knowing too much, being a nasho, after reading the info scroll on the wall, I discovered he was a South Aussie who had been killed by enemy action. A crafty killed in action! May be we all should be more careful?

My interest in CFN Borlace was rekindled when the RAEME Corps Committee (?) released a bottle of Borlace Port. Then after a small amount of research, I discovered he was buried just up the hill in the Stirling District Cemetery at Aldgate. While working one day, I had the time to look for his grave and discovered that although quite dignified it failed to mention in plain English that Doug had made the supreme sacrifice for his country.

At the 2002 AGM of the AEME/RAEME Association of South Australia Inc, in General Business, I suggested we pursue placing a supplementary plaque on his grave stating this fact. Gary Howell who knew Doug's foster niece, Lynette Little, seconded the motion, and we went on from there, getting permission from next-of-kin, Margaret Little, Office of Australian War Graves (Mr Keith Thorogood) and Adelaide Hills Council (Ms Gay Abell). Our secretary David Turner wrote many letters to help us achieve our goal, not the least was arranging for an Army Bugler, LCPL Andrew Barnett from Australian Army Band-Adelaide, to add the ceremonial touch to the service. MAJ Richard Moyses, Officer Commanding 107 Field Workshop 9CSSB, arranged for Chaplain Catie Inches-Ogden to perform the service, which she did so well, in windy conditions, but also met with David and me at the grave site the day before to check out the positioning and timings.

Our President Mike Culley, welcomed every one, about forty people attended, and then handed over to me to tell a little bit about a man I never knew, but I knew he put his hand up to join the Army, and after Corps posting to Armoured Regiment as a Driver/Signaller decided to put his hand up for Corps transfer to RAEME for an Adult Tradesman's course as a Vehicle Mechanic. He was then posted to 1 Armoured Regiment Light Aid Detachment (LAD), and put his hand up to go to 3 Cavalry Regiment LAD to go to Vietnam. Unfortunately five weeks after being in country, and five days after his 24th birthday, he was killed while riding on the rear hatch of an M113 Armoured Personnel Carrier (APC), Call Sign 30B, during Operation Albany in the Long Green area between Dat Do and the Long Hais. I have spoken to the driver Mr Gerard O'Neill of Perth who believes the weapon used to kill Doug and leg wound the Vehicle Commander was either an extremely high jumping jack mine, or a claymore type mine tied to a tree. He says immediately the explosion went off, they were sprayed by automatic weapons fire, so it sounds like a command-detonated device in the tree branches was probably the weapon used. The vehicle was not damaged and remained in service. It still might be in service still as most M113's are rebuilt and upgraded etc.

Frank Owen, one of the Corporals at Armoured Centre LAD when I was there, and an old 106 soldier, said the "Ode".

After the service Ian Campbell from Aldgate RSL invited every one back for a BBQ and drinks at the club rooms.

If any one wishes to find Doug's grave, enter the fist entrance south of Oxford Rd on Strathalbyn Rd, follow the track around to the tall pines, about 100m, and Doug's site is just 20m on your right.

Thanks to every body who helped and participated in some way to help remember the late Craftsman Douglas Graham Borlace. Lest We Forget - Bob Killoran

THE ARMY MUSEUM OF SOUTH AUSTRALIA (AMOSA)

"A moth eaten rag, on a worm eaten pole, doesn't seem likely to stir a man's soul. But it's the deeds that were done 'neath that moth eaten rag, when that pole was a staff, and that rag was a flag."

Located at Keswick Barracks AMOSA is a sub-unit of the Army History Unit dedicated to the preservation of South Australia's Army History.

Recently the assets of the South Australian Mounted Rifles Military Collection were transferred to the AMOSA inventory. This included the following Armoured Fighting Vehicles (AFV), previously on static display at 3/9 Light Horse (SAMR) in the Elizabeth Training Depot:

- a. **Medium Tank, Lee/Grant Mk 3 (Converted)** the only remaining example of a group of vehicles converted into Observation Posts (OP's) for the observation of a variety of activities at the Woomera Range. This vehicle has been fully restored as an OP in its white OP livery and it is on display.
- b. Scout Car Ferret Mk1 an original 3/9 SAMR vehicle; with full service history and until recently it had a platform fitted for use as an inspection vehicle for mounted parades. In reasonable condition it is currently undergoing restoration to full running condition.
- c. **Scout Car Ferret Mk11** in extremely poor condition, basically a hull on wheels, stripped of most assemblies and components. It is to be restored to display condition
- d. **APC Saracen** although originally a 3/9 SAMR vehicle it had also been the 107 Field Workshop recovery crock. It is in reasonable condition and it is to be restored to display condition then given time and funds it may be restored to full running condition.
- e. **Armoured Car Staghound** originally a 3/9 SAMR vehicle, it is in poor condition. Initial plans are to pacify the extensive rust and bring it to display condition.

There is a dedicated band of volunteers involved in vehicle restoration at AMOSA's Keswick Barracks workshops, however there has been only one (1) Vehicle Mechanic on duty namely **Eddy (Ted) Kaminski**. Eddy has been concentrating his efforts on the 'mechanicals' of Ferret Mk1. You will appreciate that given its fifty (50) year age including thirty (30) years of neglect 'hacking' around the Elizabeth Training Depot that there have been a lot of 'surprises' uncovered during restoration, including major damage to the brakes, a CV joint and rust. **Harold Shipp** has been heavily involved in support of this effort including the vehicle's movement between barracks, the restoration of the external sheet metal components i.e. the binning and guards and its future repainting.

It is important that we acknowledge their efforts. Well done Eddy and Harold.

However 'many hands make light work' and given the formidable tasks still ahead we are calling for tradesmen to volunteer for work on the various AFV restoration projects.

The Museum opening day/times are as follows:

Wednesdays - 0800 to 1400 hrs - for restoration, display work and group guided tours.

Sundays - 1200 to 1600 hrs - open to the general public and group guided tours.

Should there be sufficient interest from those who are unable to attend during the Wednesday timeslot, we are prepared to make arrangements to open the workshop at night.

Incidentally many members of the Association would be aware of the workshop or may have served in it, as it was previously the 13 Field Regiment LAD.

MESSAGE FROM DEPUTY HEAD OF CORPS

By the time the RAEME CRAFTSMAN magazine reaches you the Corps RSM and I will have visited DJFHQ, 3rd, 7th, 9th, 11th and 16th Brigade and 16th Air Defence Regiment. As RAEME soldiers in these areas will know we have continued with the practice of visiting the major formations on an annual basis. Funds permitting, I will visit 1st and 8th Brigade and Oakey in the second half of 2003 Ensure you all use these visits to raise issues and seek updates on matters affecting your specific trade or the Corps in general. As previously advised we will continue with the practice of keeping you abreast of other relevant issues such as issues affecting logistic corps in general and conditions of service matters.

From my perspective the visits have proven to be an excellent forum to obtain very good feedback on the many issues affecting RAEME soldiers and the corps. Many of you have raised relevant issues and I have been particularly impressed with the logic underpinning your points and the fact that we are all eager to resolve them.

In general terms the points raised by RAEME soldiers during our visits to each area have been pretty consistent. As I advised in the last RAEME newsletter, we will provide responses to specific issues you raise during these visits through the Regional RAEME Representatives. Feedback has already been provided to DJFHQ and 7th Brigade and I hope RAEME soldiers in Brisbane and Oakey have seen this.

I am in a position to provide an update on the following:

ECN 419/420/422. The integration of these three trades into one (ECN 421) is progressing well. ALTC Training Development Group (TDG) is working on this and we remain on track to commence the first "course" in 2003. TDG staff have also commenced mapping the gap training required to provide the necessary competencies to those tradesmen already in Land Command. MSD is also examining where (in terms of programming) we can conduct the gap training in 2004 to transition all of you across to ECN 421.

Subject 4 Sergeant Mechanical. The necessary developmental work for this initiative was completed and the pilot course commenced on 28 April 2003. More work is required but at this stage the intention is to progress with the necessary staff action to achieve formal sign off.

WO Artificer Ground Course. MSD has secured funding to assist TDG in developing a WO Artificer Ground course. This course will aim to provide RAEME WO with the requisite skills to fill technical appointments in areas such as the Defence Materiel Organisation. Developmental work will be complete by 30 October 2003.

RAEME Corps Seminar. SO2 Corps will shortly be forwarding a draft agenda to the HOC for consideration. We are currently seeking sponsorship and hope to invite at least two external organisations to provide presentations on issues relevant to Army and in particular to the Corps.

I am also very pleased to report that we have grown the part time capacity in our HOC team here at ALTC. In the not too distant future we will have an SO3 Corps and a WO2 Corps. Additional staff will now allow the HOC team to progress a number of initiatives we have had on the "backburner" including the development of the RAEME display at the Bandiana museum and the sifting through of a mountain of uncatalogued corps memorabilia currently in long term storage.

I look forward to seeing many of you either here at MSD, ALTC or during one of the HOC visits. Arte Et Marte.

CORPS RSM REPORT

You are probably the same as me wondering how a year can get off to such an incredible pace. The training tempo always remains much the same within ALTC but Land Command has seen increases as world developments dictate our commitment. Army has had to revise its training requirements and as a consequence funding is being redistributed to priority areas. Unfortunately this has been to the detriment of many of the planned projects for Army, some of which were issues you raised as concerns last year. These projects will be postponed and will be implemented as funding is released.

I am still on the lookout for junior and senior NCOs to take up the challenge to go to Kapooka and move into the regimental stream. We, the Corps, currently have six sergeants and eight corporals at Kapooka moulding the future soldiers of the Army. My ultimate goal is to get RAEME hat badges back into the Workshops and Tech Supports and have our RAEME RSMs taking a dominant role in the logistic units. If you can see that your career as a tradesman at corporal or sergeant rank will have you calculating production and backlog figures and you would like a challenge at managing soldiers in a regimental environment then please give the RAEME Regimental Career Adviser CAPT Mark Stone or myself a call.

Significant events this year include the ongoing development of the RAEME Corps Heritage. The Corps Committee last year passed a motion to provide assistance toward the RAEME display at the Army Museum Bandiana. The display consists of a 70s vintage Lathe Shelter; a L5 Pack Howitzer, Vietnam era, complete with a mannequin depicting a Fitter Armourer conducting repairs (the face is modelled on the devilishly good looks of WO2 Ian Pullen); and a Bren Gun Carrier, 1942 desert era, with a Vehicle Mechanic carrying out engine repairs (the face is modelled on CFN Ashley Holmes, OJT Fitter Armourer). The Corps purchased the two mannequins and will provide the personnel to help develop the displays with the assistance of the curator. If you have not seen the Army Museum Bandiana for some time it is well worth the effort to drop in if you are in the region. The museum now forms part of the National Military Museum Trail and considerable money and effort has brought the standard of the displays to a truly professional standard.

Another event that will occur on September 11 this year is the opening of the first of our two time capsules. The time capsule was buried on the site of the old RAEME Training Centre 25 years ago, however, with the development of the "Craftsman Memorial" and the demise of RAEME Training Centre the capsule was relocated to the memorial and will be opened and the contents turned over to the Army Museum.

The RAEME WO/SNCO Dinner is programmed for Saturday 18 October following the Corps Seminar on 16 and 17 October. I ask that you mark 18 October into your calendars now to allow you plenty of planning time to talk the boss into helping with the movements. More details and advertisements will be coming out soon in the Army newspaper.

INCREASED PENALTIES FOR DEFENCE MEDALS FRAUD

Penalties for fraudulently claiming Defence service will increase 15-fold under legislation introduced into Parliament recently by the Minister Assisting the Minister for Defence, Danna Vale.

Our community holds veterans and serving personnel in the highest regard.

"Their service and sacrifice in Defence of our nation deserves protection from those who wrongly seek to claim the same honour and respect.

Under the Federal Government's proposals, the penalty for wrongly claiming to be a returned soldier, sailor or airman, or wearing medals to which an individual is not entitled, will increase from a \$200 fine, to a maximum penalty of \$3,300 and up to six months imprisonment. Defence legislation specifically excluded family members of service personnel who were permitted to wear the member's medals. This Bill will also increase the penalty for defacing or destroying Defence medals or decorations from a \$200 fine to a maximum penalty of \$6,600 and/or 12 months imprisonment.

The changes were a result of concerns of the Government and the wider community regarding practices that were unlawful, deceitful and disrespectful to veterans and service personnel. The increase in these penalties will enable the Government to better protect the honour of Defence veterans and service personnel.

WATER PURIFICATION AND DESALINATION

The Federal Government has signed an \$18 million contract with Pall Corporation Australia for the supply of new Water Purification and Desalination systems for the Australian Army. The need for such equipment was identified in the 2000 Defence White Paper, and its benefits were clear when used in East Timor.

New South Wales-based Pall Corporation Australia produces a range of fixed and mobile medical, aerospace and water filtering systems for the international market. Pall has a number of current contracts with ADF.

The systems will replace the current fleet of Water Purification equipment, which has been inservice for over 15 years, and will be operated by soldiers from the Royal Australian Engineers, who have the task of providing clean drinking water to deployed land forces. The new Water Purification and Desalination systems will be modular in design and deployable on trucks and trailers or in RAAF C130 aircraft. The systems will benefit all soldiers by providing high quality drinking water for training and operational deployments anywhere in the world. In particular, the ability to be able to desalinate large quantities of seawater was one of the key capability requirements learnt from the deployment to East Timor. The contract will also provide for spare parts, training and technical documentation.

An initial production version of the systems will be trialed in May 2004 with the remainder planned to commence delivery from late 2004.

Darryl continues to introduce new supporters to the museum. Their financial support has been invaluable in allowing the museum to put into action the Museums Development Plans. Well done Darryl.

The museum is very fortunate to have our very own "Bob the Builder" in Bob Bauerle and Ted "Picasso" Mayer, together they have been turning the museum into a work of art with new display cabinets and paint work. Thanks fellas for some outstanding work.

Teams of professional volunteers under the direction of Colonel John Neale, Chairman of the Army Museum Bandiana Foundation, have been doing a fantastic job in sorting out the extensive uniform collection, medals, AWAS's and Australian Service Nurse's displays. Their knowledge, enthusiasm and interest in the development of the museum is very much appreciated.

By the time you read this article, a number of projects that are presently under way will have been completed. These being, the establishment of a new Australian Service Nurse's display complete with the uniformed mannequins. The refurbishment of the 2/23rd Battalion display complete with a photograph of all of the Battalion's gallantry award recipients.

Presently under refurbishment is the Australian Army Catering Corps display area, which is really looking great, and the Royal Australian Corps of Transport area including the development of a maritime section. The Army Apprentices area is also undergoing refurbishment as I write.

Get to know the staff

Mr Bryan Anderson commenced duty as the new ASO2 on the 6th of December 2002 on transfer from Townsville. Bryan will be the first point of contact for the museum shop, bookings and general enquiries. Bryan attended a First Aid course in April and will attend the Army History Unit conservation course conducted at the Australian War Memorial in the second half of the year. Welcome Bryan.

Future development plans

The second half of the year will see the establishment of an educational facility in the area that had previously housed the small weapons display. This facility will be used to provide presentations to schoolchildren, special interest groups and soldiers in conjunction with their

visit to the museum. The facility will provide seating for sixty with an overhead projection system, VCR, DVD, OHP and sound system.

After the completion of the educational facility, the Chaplain's display is next on the list and will be relocated. The area presently housing the Chaplain's display, ammunition, parachute rigger and aerial despatch displays will be relocated and new displays will be constructed. These new displays will feature World War Two, POW's, BCOF, Korea, Malaya, Borneo and Vietnam.

As these changes are underway, a new outdoor shelter will be constructed to house the recovery vehicles display. This shelter will complete the outdoor display area apart from a covered walkway to link the displays. We plan to open the outdoor display area during the second half of 2004.

ARMY RESERVE TECHNICAL AND TRADE SCHEME

The Army Reserve Technical and Trade Scheme (ARTTS) has been in place since early 2002. The scheme was introduced to increase the number of trade qualified members in the Army Reserves and to enable Reserve Apprentices to be able to complete Army recognised trade training, while working and training in the vicinity of their homes and families.

In 2002, the first intake of Reserve Apprentice Vehicle Mechanics were enlisted and attended Common Recruit Training (CRT) at ARTC, Kapooka. Since then they have attended Army training activities, courses, formal TAFE training, experienced On the Job Training (OJT) in 8CSSB's Workshop and with civilian host employers in the Newcastle area such as Komatsu and Cummins. 8CSSB and 21 Construction Regiment, in the Melbourne area, have been the pilot locations for the scheme. With the first year successfully completed, more units within the Army will enlist Reserve Apprentices, expanding the scheme nation wide.

In 2003, the second intake of new Reserve Apprentices were enlisted into 8CSSB into the scheme, in the trades of Vehicle Mechanics, Fitter/Armourers and Cooks. A 4th year Vehicle Mechanic apprentice has also been enlisted, and 8CSSB are recruiting for several clerical trainees.

The Reserve Apprentices are employed by HGT Australia Ltd, a Newcastle based group training company, and parade with 8CSSB as Army Reserve members. While at TAFE training and placement with host employers, Reserve Apprentices are paid by the group training company. The group training company pays for workers compensation, superannuation, TAFE

fees and leave entitlements. While on unit training activities and OJT at the unit, members are paid Army Reserve Training Days. When members work at the unit for block periods of 5 or more days, the group training company is entitled to payment under the Employer Support Payment Scheme. This payment is used to subsidise the rate at which the Reserve Apprentices are charged out to civilian host employers by the group training company. This provides an incentive to civilian host employers to employ Reserve Apprentices and release them for the military training required under the scheme.

Military training for the Reserve Apprentices included CRT, All Corps Soldier Skills (CSS) and reserve unit training on Tuesday nights, weekends and annual exercises. Members also attend driver courses when available. Army competency recognition is dependent on the trade. For example, Reserve Apprentice cooks are qualified within their employment category once they have completed Initial Employment Training (IET), whereas Reserve Apprentice Vehicle Mechanics are allocated to ECN 510 (General Establishment awaiting corps training) at the completion of CRT and progress to ECN 229-1 from the commencement of the fourth year of their apprenticeship.

Feedback from training courses, other Army units (8CSSB Reserve Apprentice Vehicle Mechanics and Fitters have been involved in support tasking to 17 Construction Regiment, 12/16 Hunter River Lancers and 4RAR (CDO)) and civilian host employers indicates that on the whole, the Reserve Apprentices are considered to be of a high standard, and work well as a team. Several members have also expressed interest in transfers to the ARA Trainee system (a second year VM apprentice has submitted a transfer application), so the scheme shows the promise of benefits to Regular Army units as well as Reserve units.

NEW PRECISION LASER GUNNERY TRAINING SYSTEM FOR ARMY

The Federal Government has announced the signing of a \$7.9 million contract with Swedish company SAAB Training Systems for a new simulation based training capability for the Army. The new Precision Gunnery Training System is a laser-based capability that will train Leopard tank crews. The systems will be employed at the Army School of Armour and 1st Armoured Regiment to enhance the gunnery skills of Leopard crew commanders and gunners.

The new training system utilises state of the art technology to simulate all aspects of gunnery training. This is an example of an effective use of simulation technology to achieve low risk, cost effective training.

The contract will also provide for training, maintenance support and technical documentation. An initial production version of the systems will be trialed in August 2004, with the full capability due to be introduced into service by December 2004.

HE SAVED CHANGI CHAPEL

(From the "Monash Journal" 17 June 2003) - By Kellee Nolan

Almost 60 years ago, Rowville resident Max Lee stood in the deserted confines of the infamous Changi prisoner of war camp in Singapore. It was the close of World War II in September 1945 and Mr.Lee was part of a voluntary Australian army unit that stayed on in Singapore and Sumatra to account for as many dead, missing and unidentified Allied soldiers as they could. A small outdoor chapel caught his eye and Mr.Lee called out to a fellow soldier burning the camp buildings to the ground, asking him not to touch it. He made a decision then to save the chapel and send it to Australia.

More than 40 years later, his vision became reality and the chapel was opened at Duntroon in Canberra by Sir Edward 'Weary' Dunlop as a national war memorial for Australia's 35,000 former prisoners of war on August 15, 1988.

Last week, Mr.Lee was awarded the Order of Australia Medal (OAM) for his service to the community, particularly through the preservation of the Changi Chapel.

Mr.Lee drew sketches of the chapel before it was disassembled and shipped to Australia.

Mr.Lee said that after returning to Australia and civilian life, marrying his wife Marjorie and rearing children, he assumed the chapel had been received and assembled and did not chase up its whereabouts until the 1960s. But in the mid 1960s, he visited the Australian War Memorial with his family and asked to see the chapel only to find, sadly, that it wasn't there.

Mr.Lee continued his life immersed in his work as a senior executive at AMP and, for the past 27 years, living in Glen Waverley. He was a member of various community organisations including the Glen Waverley and Wheelers Hill Probus Club and volunteered for the Glen Waverley Red Shield Appeal for the Salvation Army.

In 1997, Mr.Lee received a telegram from the Veteran Affairs Department in Canberra. "The chapel has been found in storage in Duntroon and had been there for 42 years," he said.

For getting the chapel from that point to having it proclaimed Australia's national prisoner of war memorial, Mr.Lee pays tribute to many people, including his friend David Simpson, a Glen Waverley architect who drew up plans for its reconstruction.

"The little chapel how has become a national memorial for all Australian prisoners of war and that puts it into a perspective of its own," Mr.Lee said. "To prisoners of war that's their mainstay, their main memorial, and it's highly respected by them."

At the age of 80, Mr.Lee is still a volunteer with Open Family Australia, helping provide meals to homeless youths in St.Kilda and the city.

He is humble about his voluntary contributions and receiving his OAM as he does not see charitable work as something done for reward.

"I was quite happy to do my bit and my share," he said.

GOVERNMENT BID TO PROTECT 'ANZAC' INTERNATIONALLY

The Australian Government has joined forces with the New Zealand Government to seek international protection for the word 'ANZAC', the Minister for Veterans' Affairs, Danna Vale, announced recently.

The two nations are making a joint application to the World Intellectual Property Organisation (WIPO) to control the use of the word 'Anzac'. If the application was successful, the 164 countries that are party to the Paris Convention for the Protection of Industrial Property, administered by WIPO, would be required to refuse any application to register 'Anzac' as a trademark and to prohibit its unauthorised use as a trademark.

In 1921 the Australian Government legislated to protect the word 'Anzac', including its use as a trademark, and similar protection exists in New Zealand - a reflection of the significance of the Anzac legend to both nations. Now we are seeking to extend this protection through international treaties.

The move to seek international protection for the word 'Anzac' was prompted by an attempt to register the word 'Anzak' as a trademark in Turkey (Anzak is the Turkish equivalent of Anzac). A joint Australia-New Zealand submission to the Turkish Patent Institute was successful in ensuring the registration was declined.

Our two nations have a proud and shared history in wars, conflicts and peace operations. Since the word 'Anzac' was coined to describe the joint Australian and New Zealand Corps during World War One it has come to represent the prized values of courage, determination and mateship epitomised by those who serve in the defence of our nations. This joint application for international protection of the word 'Anzac' shows that the Anzac spirit is as strong as ever, and is evidence of the continuing close relationship between New Zealand and Australia", said New Zealand Associate Minister of Arts, Culture and Heritage and Associate Minister of Commerce, Hon.Judith Tizard MP.
