

2005 RAEME "SOLDIER OF THE YEAR" CENTRAL REGION

In 2003 the Association initiated an award to the best ARA and the best GRes "RAEME Soldier of the Year" in Central Region. This is a separate award from the annual "RAEME Craftsman of the Year" awards which are RAEME Head of Corps awards. The reason that we initiated this separate award is because the Head of Corps award is restricted to the rank of Craftsman. Our award includes the ranks of Lance Corporal and Corporal.

The awards consist of a personal trophy for each recipient and a perpetual plaque that is held by the recipient's unit. All RAEME soldiers in South Australia, including Broken Hill, are eligible for nomination and candidates will be assessed on trade skills and soldier skills.

The Battery Commander of Support Battery 16AD, currently MAJ Karel Dubsky, is responsible for promotion of the award among all ARA personnel in South Australia and selection of the winning candidate. The Officer Commanding 107 Field Workshop 9CSSB, currently MAJ Dick Moyses, is responsible for promotion of the award among all GRes personnel in South Australia and selection of the winning candidate.

The Award Ceremony will take place at the 2005 RAEME Birthday Family Function on Sunday 27 November (good luck to all serving RAEME soldiers - Ed).

RESTORATION OF THE WWI GERMAN FIELD GUN

Restoration has commenced on the Field Howitzer recovered from Moonta and being worked on every Monday at 107 Field Workshop by 4 members of the AEME/RAEME Association of South Australia Inc., Graham Janz, Keith Tainsh, John Howard and Robin Maslen.

It is in a very bad state and will need the wheels completely rebuilt by a wheelwright (cost approximately \$4,000) and new trails manufactured hopefully within our resources. We will also need to manufacture about 400 steel rivets, so if anyone knows of a willing volunteer blacksmith type who might be interested in helping please let me know. At this time of writing, the front armour plate shield has had some holes and cracks welded and ground and the rear part of the trails that has broken off has had some of its fabrication de-riveted.

It is a happy little work party each Monday who delight in keeping the workshop personnel awake with our banging and grinding.

We keep in contact with the Moonta Heritage Trust through our local AEME/RAEME Association of South Australia Inc. member, Bruce Watson, who lives at Port Hughes, and will organise the financial negotiations with the Trust as we progress.

RAEME NATIONAL ASSOCIATION MEETING 17-18 MAY 2005

A meeting was held at Bandiana over the period 17-18 May to discuss the establishment of a national RAEME association. The Head of Corps, BRIG David McGahey and the Representative Colonel Commandant, COL Graham Smith co-chaired the meeting. The meeting was attended by each of the Colonels Commandant, the Head of Corps staff and representatives for each of the Regional RAEME Associations. For further detail on the discussions from the meeting a copy of the minutes can be located on the intranet Corps website (if you would like a copy of the Minutes, please contact me, David Turner, on phone 08 8381 3644, after hours, and I will e-mail / post a copy to you - Ed).

A meeting of the regional RAEME associations has been long overdue. The forum provided an ideal opportunity to discuss and compare the range of organisational structures, services provided and activities conducted within each of the regions. It was revealed that the issues and challenges faced by the associations were common across each of the regions. All associations agreed that there is significant potential benefit in the sharing of information and the aligning of certain structures, services and activities. Over the two half day sessions the key areas of discussion included:

- establishment of a national database.
- consolidate the mainstream Corps merchandise items and promote nationally,
- Corps input to the Corps historical collection on display at the Bandiana Army Museum,
- establishment of a national Corps activities calendar,
- linking of regional websites and the establishment of a Corps website on the WWW, and
- Association representation on the Corps Committee.

The outcomes from the meeting were very positive. A range of action items were identified which will require on-going development. Action officers have been identified. At the closure of the meeting COL Smith confirmed the Corps Committee is very firmly committed to a national association. From this first meeting there is a fair amount of house keeping required. It was proposed that an association representative attends the Corps Committee meeting. John Curtis (WA association) volunteered to attend the October 2005 committee meeting. Subject to availability of resources it is proposed to hold a national association meeting over the period 16-17 May 2006.

ANZAC DAY REPORT 2005

At the 2004 AGM it was decided to accept the offer of MAJ Karel Dubsky to lead the 2005 ANZAC Day March through the city and later, the Management Committee gave permission for Karel's father, Steve, to march with the Association as this would be the first time that they have been able to march together on ANZAC Day.

We had quite a good roll-up, approximately 50-50 WW2 and Post WW2 members being present. The silent enemy, age, was evident with a few of the 'old blokes' opting for the transport, kindly organised by Karel, who used his influence as Senior RAEME Representative Central Region and Battery Commander of Support Battery (the Workshop), 16th Air Defence Regiment and, with permission of the ANZAC Day March Committee, to provide another vehicle and driver. In all approximately 40 members took part in the march and under Karel's leadership I believe we were the best disciplined Group on the march. This year the Banner Bearers were both serving soldiers, CPL Martin Potter from 3/9 Light Horse (SAMR) Tech Support Troop (the Workshop) and CFN Jeremy Stevens from Support Battery 16th Air Defence Regiment.

The weather was very mild and once we got going, it was not long before the droplets caused by recent excesses became evident. MAJOR INVESTMENT IN SPECIAL FORCES CAPABILITY

Australia's Special Forces will benefit from a major investment in new leading edge capability and technology, Defence Minister Robert Hill said today.

Project Redfin, with an intended expenditure of between \$350 million and \$450 million, aims to provide new capabilities to give the Special Forces a technology edge over emerging threats.

Senator Hill outlined Project Redfin while unveiling Defence's latest combat device to be issued to soldiers in Iraq - a device that allows soldiers to shoot around corners. The new viewing device will be attached on top of rifles to allow soldiers to look through the device to detect and engage targets from a position of cover. Senator Hill said the new devices will be deployed to Iraq over the next few weeks providing an important technology that will improve the protection of our troops. The new device, developed by the Defence Science and Technology Organisation (DSTO) in South Australia and produced by BAE Systems, is part of the Howard Government's election commitment to improve the fighting capability and safety of the Army's regular infantry battalions in combat operations.

Senator Hill will today visit the Special Forces Regiment at Swanbourne Barracks in Western Australia to discuss the Regiment's capability needs and priorities. Today's discussions will help shape the proposal on the capability requirements that will be considered by Cabinet this year as part of Project Redfin.

As part of the Special Forces equipment package, a number of specific technology options will be investigated by Government covering the wide range of Special Forces roles, including special reconnaissance, offensive operations, special recovery, support operations, counter terrorism and response to chemical, biological and radiation incidents. The funding will cover the replacement of some existing capabilities and systems, additional combat equipment, communications, new special operations vehicles and improved air and maritime mobility capabilities. Senator Hill said the new capabilities that will be purchased are expected to be announced next year with the new equipment expected to enter service from 2007. "This investment marks another step in a series of capability developments for our Special Forces," Senator Hill said. "National security is the first priority of the Howard Government. Project Redfin will further boost Australia's national security capabilities to strengthen our defences at home and will provide greater protection to personnel deployed on overseas operations. New capabilities will enable our Special Forces to continue to be flexible, mobile and adaptable to provide specialist military responses to threats that impact on Australia's security. Australia's

Special Forces have demonstrated their effectiveness during the Sydney Olympics and recent operations in Iraq, Afghanistan and East Timor. Our Special Forces are among the best in the world and this is due not only to their skills but also their supplies and equipment. This new capability commitment will ensure they continue to operate to the best of their ability with the best possible equipment."

HEAVY TANK TRANSPORTERS FOR DEFENCE

A \$16 million contract has been awarded to an Australian manufacturer to provide 14 Heavy Tank Transporters and associated commercial repair and maintenance support, Defence Minister Robert Hill announced today.

Senator Hill said Defence has awarded the vehicle contract to MAN Military Vehicles Systems (Australia). The tank transporters will allow the new M1A1 Abram tanks and M88A2 Hercules armoured recovery vehicles to be transported on Australian roads.

Senator Hill said more than half of the contract value will be going directly to Australian industry. "As part of the contract with MAN, Australian owned and operated Brisbane-based company Drake Trailers will manufacture and supply 14 new heavy duty trailers," Senator Hill said. "Brisbane-based MAN Automotive Imports will then make final modifications to another 14 imported Prime Movers and will be conducting compliance testing and managing the ongoing repair and maintenance support. This is another example of Defence and Australian industry working together to provide new assets for our Defence Force. The Heavy Tank Transporter represents an important component of the replacement tank capability."

In October last year, Australia signed an agreement with the United States to buy a new fleet of M1A1 Abrams tanks. Under this agreement, the US Government will provide 59 refurbished and updated M1A1 Abrams tanks, seven M88 Hercules Armoured Recovery vehicles, advanced gunnery and driver training simulators, training and other support equipment and a range of spares. The M1A1 Abrams tanks will provide a major increase in capability over the present Leopard tanks. The new tanks will also provide our soldiers with greatly increased levels of protection and survivability on the battlefield.

Delivery of the Heavy Tank Transporters will commence in mid 2006, in time to meet the first tanks when they arrive from the United States. They will be immediately put to work delivering tanks and recovery vehicles to training establishments and operational units.

INAUGURATION OF THE NATIONAL SERVICEMEN'S HERITAGE PRECINCT AT WACOL

The Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Defence, Teresa Gambaro announced today the inauguration of the heritage precinct at the former Sanananda Barracks site to commemorate Wacol's military history over the last 50 fifty years.

"In April, I announced the creation of a heritage precinct at the former Sanananda Barracks Wacol in a joint collaboration between the Commonwealth and the Queensland Branch of the National Servicemen's Association of Australia," Ms Gambaro said. "Today, I am pleased to officially inaugurate the establishment of the precinct."

The heritage precinct covers approximately 1.4 hectares centred around the existing chapel and parade ground and also includes four buildings which have been relocated from the Sanananda Barracks site.

"The Government is committed to ensuring the heritage values of the site are protected," Ms Gambaro said. "The creation of this precinct to commemorate the history of Wacol, particularly that relating to the national servicemen and to maintain these important community associations is the most suitable way to ensure these values are preserved. The Queensland National Servicemen's Association and the Government have worked closely together over the past three months to create an outcome that has positive benefits for all concerned."

NEW BUSHMASTERS ROLL OFF BENDIGO PRODUCTION LINE

Defence's new fleet of Bushmaster vehicles which will provide state-of-the-art transport protection for Australian soldiers is currently rolling off ADI's production line in Bendigo, Victoria. Defence Minister Robert Hill today visited ADI's Bendigo plant where work is underway to produce a total of 300 new vehicles for the Australian Defence Force as part of the Government's \$350 million Land 116 Project Bushranger.

"The Australian designed and manufactured vehicle is being produced at Bendigo at a rapid rate, with approximately one vehicle coming off the production line every two days resulting in a total of 100 vehicles produced per year," Senator Hill said. "Full acceptance of the Bushmaster vehicles by Defence is expected in the next few months, and the full fleet of vehicles is expected to be in service by mid 2007. ADI is also looking at export opportunities for the new Bushmaster, potentially exporting several hundred vehicles to countries including the United States and Iraq. These new opportunities have the potential to provide further economic benefits for the Bendigo region and continued employment growth in the Defence and manufacturing sectors."

The vehicles combine protection, performance, safety and comfort to operate over demanding terrain. They are designed to transport up to ten troops and provide high level protection on the battlefield against landmines, improvised explosive devices, mortar fragments and small arms fire.

"It is a credit to ADI and the Defence Materiel Organisation for their hard work over recent years in getting to this stage where ADI is in full rate production of a vehicle that Army has great confidence in."

Earlier this year 10 new Bushmaster vehicles were deployed to southern Iraq with the AI Muthanna Task Group to provide additional transport protection for the ADF personnel deployed to the southern province. The currently deployment of the Bushmaster vehicles is the first operational deployment for the vehicles, although an earlier version was trialed in East Timor. The vehicle can maintain speeds in excess of 90 km/h on Australian roads with a range of more than 500km. Each Bushmaster vehicle is fitted with a weapon station capable of mounting the Army's light machine guns.

During his visit to ADI, Senator Hill was also able to inspect the production of a fleet of new High Mobility Engineering Vehicle. This is an engineering vehicle previously produced for the ADF which is now short-listed for a similar program to deliver up to 650 military specification tractors to the United States Army.
