ITS AN HONOUR

One of our members received an award in the Queen's Birthday Honours list. The following is a copy of an article by Adam Todd, which was published in the 13 June edition of the Messenger.

A Man Determined to Remember the Fallen

WHEN Frank Owen joined the army more than half a century ago he had no inkling he'd still be serving well into his 60s.

Today, Mr Owen's service isn't performed with a



gun in his hands, the Morphett Vale RSL president has been working hard for the past two decades to maintain the memory of the fallen.

Mr Owen, 68, who grew up in Streaky Bay and moved to Morphett Vale in the 1980s, received an Order of Australia Medal (OAM) on Monday (June 11), for services to the Morphett Vale RSL.

"It's just an amazing honour," he said. "You never do it expecting this sort of recognition;"

Mr Owen joined the army in 1955 as an apprentice mechanic at the encouragement of his father, Jim Owen, the then president of the Streaky Bay RSL. "I'd always wanted to do something in a uniform, I'd been in the Scouts as a kid, the army was perfect," he said. He remained in the army for the next 30 years - apart from a short break in the 1960s - based in Victoria, and served in Singapore, Papua New Guinea and Vietnam.

Mr Owen left the army in 1986 and moved to Adelaide with his wife Dierdre and two of their three children.

Almost immediately he joined the Morphett Vale RSL and became its president in 1992. During his time as president, Mr Owen has overseen a significant increase in membership and also been involved in some major projects in the Onkaparinga area, including the Onkaparinga Memorial Gardens, the Eternal Flame, the Wall of Remembrance and the establishment of the ANZAC Youth Vigil in the south. Mrs Owen also is president of the Morphett Vale Women's Auxiliary and has no plans to bring his service to an end. "We are committed to honouring those who made the supreme sacrifice as well as assisting those who have returned," Mr Owen said'... - I would hope to be around for another 20 to 30 years."



LOOK AFTER YOUR MEDALS

Received from Precision Medal Mounting who are a member and sponsor of the Military Police Association of Australia.

I feel that I have a responsibility to make members aware of the significant value of their honours and awards.

Not only do they have high sentimental value to the recipient and their families etc, they have in most instances great monitory value to boot.

Therefore some serious consideration should be given to the fact that they are a substantial asset within the household when considering house and contents insurance.

The inclusion of medals as a SPECIAL ITEM is most often overlooked. I can speak from personal experience when my father lost his original rack of seven and the heartbreak he went through.

Below is a brief list of the more common medals awarded to Australian Service Men and Women and there current value. Food for thought and you can quickly do the sums

Top end value relates to a medal in its original box untouched and unmounted

Bottom end value relates to medal in very poor condition with no ribbon or mounting.

I would say that 90% of the medals that pass through my hands ARE at the top end of this scale. Some "groups" of medals depending on there uniqueness can be valued higher again.

SUFFERING FROM HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE.

Have you heard about Dr Red's Rosella Punch

Recently on TV there was an announcement of how a natural substance manufactured in Queensland has been found to significantly lower high blood pressure.

Rosella Punch Human Trial:

Cardiovascular disease is the major cause of death in developed countries and will become the major cause of death throughout the world within the next decade. Treatment with drugs can be very effective in reducing cardiovascular disease. However, this is an expensive option not available to most of the world's population and also there is the possibility of severe adverse effects. A better option is to introduce food as a medicine, to reduce hypertension, obesity and diabetes, which are the three common risk factors of cardiovascular disease.

Rosella punch is an antioxidant-enriched product based on *Hibiscus sabdariffa* (Rosella), Turmeric and olive leaf extracts.




Figure 1: Systolic blood pressure during a 4 week treatment with Rosella Punch

At the University of Queensland, we have tested Rosella Punch on a genetic model of hypertension, the Spontaneously Hypertensive Rat. The results show addition of the Rosella Punch to the diet of these rats decreased systolic blood pressure by about 30 mm Hg following 4-6 weeks of treatment. The Spontaneously Hypertensive Rat is used as a standard model for testing potential new antihypertensive medication before human administration; all current drug treatments of human hypertension reduce blood pressure in this rat model. Thus, we are now conducting a pilot study in Tamil Nadu (India) on 50 male patients aged between 40 and 50 years with mild to moderate hypertension. Half of the patients are given Rosella Punch while the other half are given Ginger Punch Prostate Formula; the dose is 25 ml of the Punch diluted with one glass of water, taken twice a day for 4 weeks. Blood pressure is being monitored every week. The results have been very promising. As can be seen in Figure 1, treatment with Rosella Punch produced a continuous decrease in blood pressure over the 4-week period, returning blood pressure to approximately normal values. This is clear evidence that food can be an effective medicine for the most common cardiovascular symptom, an increased blood pressure.

Army Combat Badge

Army Combat Badge



What and why is it?

Most members will be familiar with the Infantry Combat Badge (ICB), introduced by RA Infantry in July 1970. This device introduced considerable division within the Australian Army regarding the relative "worth" of the individual/ unit/ service. Other Corps and notably other Arms rejected proposals to implement similar corps specific devices. See

which makes interesting reading in that it discloses the thinking within the Military Board regarding status of and eligibility for the ICB.

Lt-Gen Leahy, when introducing the Army Combat Badge (ACB) is reported to have said. "We see now in our combined arms teams that infantry, armour and combat service support are all essentially doing the same job" and their efforts deserve to be recognised.

Eligibility criteria is detailed in DI(A) PERS 119-1, which can be seen in full at http://www.defence.gov.au/army/PUBS/downloads/ap119_01.pdf .

However, the following extracts should be sufficient for most.

INTRODUCTION

The Army Combat Badge (ACB) is awarded to any member of the Australian Regular Army (ARA) or Army Reserve (all elements) on Continuous Full-time Service (CFTS) or other Reserve member in exceptional circumstances, for service in warlike operations or situations. This award does not replace the Infantry Combat Badge (ICB).

PURPOSE

The purpose of the ACB is to recognise any member of the Army who was force assigned to an infantry, armour, artillery, aviation or combat engineer based combat team/battle group, or similar unit/sub-unit, and who has served for a specified period of time on warlike operations.

Eligibility

Any member of any Corps who were force assigned to an infantry, armour, artillery, aviation or combat engineer based combat team/battle group or similar unit/sub-unit, and has given either continuous or an aggregate of 90 days satisfactory service on warlike operations for a single deployment or operation is eligible to wear the ACB. The Chief of Army may alter the eligibility criteria depending on the operation or deployment.

RETROSPECTIVITY

Eligibility. The award of the ACB is retrospective to Malaya 1948.

Approval. Approved units are listed below. Approval outside those designated units is to be submitted to ACMC for approval by respective Head of Corps (HOC) through DGPERS–A

Distribution. The ACB is a dress embellishment not an award and therefore falls outside the honours and awards system. Internal Army resources are insufficient to ensure distribution to all past members through formal Army channels. The following processes are to apply for distribution of the ACB to members eligible by retrospectivity and having served in the units listed below.

Service Prior to 1989

Corps associations have been requested to provide the respective HOC with a list of eligible persons for endorsement, noting the requirement for the list to contain members of all corps who served with the appropriate unit.

Respective HOC are to endorse the list and forward it to DGPERS-A. DGPERS-A approves the list and dispatches the requisite number of ACB to the Corps association. Corps associations are responsible for distributing the ACB to eligible members including postage and handling costs.

- 3. Members should provide copies of other supporting documents (certified true if possible talk to a JP).

90th Anniversary of Battle of Beersheba (1917)

Beersheba 2007 has been declared a major event by the Army and 3/9 LH (SAMR) is to conduct the celebration of the 90th anniversary of the 'Battle of Gaza – Beersheba' (fought on 31 Oct 1917) on Wednesday the 31 Oct 07 and Saturday 3 Nov 07.

The general concept is for the following activities to be conducted:

- a. On Wed 31 Oct 07 the conduct of a memorial service at the LH Memorial followed by an officers formal dinner at the NM&AFC.
- b. On the afternoon of Sat 3 Nov 07 conduct a 'Light Horse Re-enactment' at Elder Park,
- c. To be followed by the Regiment parading it's Guidon's at a ceremonial parade at the Torrens Parade Ground, and
- d. In the evening, in conjunction with the South Australian Mounted Rifles Association (SAMRA), conduct an all ranks formal dinner in the Torrens Training Depot (TTD). RAEME personnel who have served with 3/9 LH will be invited to attend.

Beersheba 2007 – The Historical Background

The 'Battle of Gaza – Beersheba' was fought on 31 Oct 1917. Two (2) attempts prior to Oct 1917 had failed to capture Gaza.

The British Eastern Expeditionary Force was commanded by GEN Sir Edmund Allenby and it was an Army of two (2) Corps including;

- XX Corps (British) was commanded by LTGEN Sir Philip Chetwode, he conceived the concept for the 'Battle of Gaza - Beersheba' and the plan for the liberation of Palestine.
- Desert Mounted Corps (DMC) comprising the Australian Mounted Division and the ANZAC Mounted Division was commanded by LTGEN Sir Harry Chauvel.

Allenby had recently replaced the incompetent Cairo based military governor GEN Sir Archibald Murray who was not a field commander and had failed in the Sinai

Allenby held Chauvel in high regard as they had served together in the South African (Boer) War where Allenby commanded the 5th Inniskilling Dragoon's (5ID). The 5ID are now the Royal Dragoon Guards (RDG) allied to 3/9 LH (SAMR).

The plan for the battle was approved and required XX Corp to take Gaza and to provide support to the DMC.

Allenby's orders to Chauvel demanded the DMC take Beersheba on Day 1 of the battle. The importance of Beersheba was its water and its access to the Hebron Rd or the road to Jerusalem.

Chauvel's plans were as follows:

- To conduct a night ride from wells twenty six (26) miles to the south west at Khalasa and Asluj to Beersheba.
- 1 Bde (1ALH, 2ALH and 3ALH) were to conduct a preliminary operation supported by the Somerset Bty Royal Horse Artillery (RHA) to capture Tel el Sabah, a 100 metre high salient 3 miles to the east of Beersheba.
- Following the preliminary operation 1 Bde supported by the NZMR Bde was to capture Beersheba.
- 3 Bde (8 ALH, 9ALH & 10 ALH) was to secure the Hebron Road at Sakaty, 3 miles to the North East of the town and act as a cut off force.
- 4 Bde including the Royal Yeomanry were Corps Reserve.

Following the substantial reinforcement by the enemy of Tel el Sabah, Chauvel committed extra resources in support of 1 Bde including the NZMR Bde and 9 ALH.

Of significance, this event was to be the first and only time that the South Australian Regiments the 3 ALH and the 9 ALH were to support each other in the entire campaign. MAJ T J Daly (9ALH) was award the DSO for his conduct in the battle.

1 Bde had failed to take the Tel in time and conscious of Allenby's orders Chauvel decided to commit his reserve. With the day on the wain 4 Bde charged and took the town at nightfall.

The liberation of Palestine had begun. Almost 12 months later on 2 Oct 1918 during the 'Great Ride to Damascus', 9ALH under Daly charged a Turkish force and captured their General, 1500 all ranks, several field guns, other weapons and the Standard of the 46th Turkish Regiment.

The Torrens Parade Ground is a significant site for the Regiment because it was from there that the contingents of South Australian Mounted Rifles (SAMR) departed for the South African (Boer) War.

FORT LARGS GUNS REPORT April - May 2007.

On Saturday 14th April 2007 the only two members of our work party who could attend were Robin Maslen and myself. Most of our work was done on the northern gun as we managed to find some bolts to fit the large brass cover over the main gears. However we still have to get four brackets made up to suit both guns as the old ones have gone missing over the years since the guns were pulled apart to be sandblasted.

Robin had to use some heat to free up one of the main shafts on the southern gun so that the main support bracket with the brass bush could be bolted on to the gun. Now this has been done, the main shaft can be fitted back on the gun as well as the large brass cover.

On Saturday 12th May 2007 four people turned up including a new member to our working party, John Fuller from the Army Museum at Keswick I had some time to show John Fuller over both guns and also the mechanical shell lift below the gun in the ammunition storeroom. With the arrival of Graham Janz and Robin Maslen, we all got together to see what parts and bolts we had to replace back on both guns.

With the help of John Fuller, I managed to fit the large brass cover on the southern gun over the main gears with only two bolts to secure it for now until we can get two brackets made up to secure the front of the cover onto to the body of the gun, hopefully at the next work party.

Robin and Graham had a few problems at first getting one of the main hand wheel shaft to line up with the key way in the brass gear in the top control box on the southern gun, as this shaft is part of the controls which traverse of the gun. We did get quite a bit of work done in the two hours we were there.

Next working party will be on Saturday 7th July from 10 am.
