With the passing of Frank Owen, we have been unable to identify anyone representing the RAEME Vietnam Veteran's group for this March. We are assuming there will be enough members to march under their own banner. Could someone who is marching contact Richard Moyses, Bob Matthew or Don Harvy to ensure the veterans banner is available for use in the march. If there are not enough to make it an acceptable size group, we suggest those members attending join with the Association in Group 13 (with your Banner).

The route is the same as last year and Salutes (banners to be lowered on the "eyes right") are to be paid at the National War Memorial, the South African War Memorial on North Terrace and the Vice-Regal Saluting point on the Eastern side of King William Road near the Parade Ground at Torrens Training Depot.

March Conduct and Paying of Compliments

Unit flags, banners and roundels are to be lowered for all salutes. Yellow unit identification signs are to remain upright and facing the front at the saluting points, except on approaching the Vice-Regal, where they are turned half-right for the salute on the order EYES-RIGHT and then returned to face the front on the order EYES-FRONT.

<u>Carers</u>: Two carers or wheelchair pusher are permitted to assist a veteran within unit ranks. Wheelchairs to be in front row.

INTRODUCING OUR NEW HEAD OF CORPS – BRIG JAMES ALLEN



Brigadier Allen was born in Adelaide in 1970. After completing an Honours Degree in Electrical Engineering at Adelaide University in 1993 he was commissioned and appointed to RAEME. He was initially posted to a range of logistic appointments including Adelaide Logistic Battalion, 101st Field Workshop and Aviation Support Group Workshop. He also completed a six-month detachment with the 4th Regiment Army Air Corps, England, as part of the Officer's Long Aeronautical Engineering Course.

In 1998, Brigadier Allen was promoted to Captain and posted to the 162nd Recce Sqn as the TST Commander. During this period Brigadier Allen was detached to the 171st Op Spt Sqn and deployed to Bougainville. In 2000, he was posted, on exchange, to the 101st Airborne Division, Fort Campbell, Kentucky as the Ops Offr of the 8th Maintenance Battalion. During his tenure Brigadier Allen deployed to Kosovo where he performed the role of Task Force Maintenance Officer. In recognition of this service he was awarded the Meritorious Service Medal.

In 2002, Brigadier Allen was posted to the Armed Reconnaissance Helicopter Project as the Integrated Logistic Support Manager. After studying French at the Australian Defence School of Languages in 2004 he was posted to the Australian Embassy in France as the Technical Liaison Officer and Assistant Defence Attaché.

Brigadier Allen graduated from Australian Command and Staff College in 2007 and was posted to the Land 17 Artillery Replacement Project as a Systems Engineer. In late 2008 he deployed to Darfur as a Logistics Operations Officer and Deputy Commander Australian Contingent. Post deployment he returned to the Directorate of Technical Airworthiness as a Deputy Director. In 2011 Brigadier Allen deployed to Kandahar as an embedded J5 within Regional Command (South).

In 2012 Brigadier Allen was posted as the Program Manager for the Multi Role Helicopter Project. He was promoted to Colonel in 2015 and assumed the role of Project Director within the same project. In 2017 he was posted as the Director Cargo Helicopter and Unmanned Surveillance Program Office in Brisbane.

Brigadier Allen was posted on promotion as the Director General Army Aviation Systems on 31 Mar 20 and assumed the role of HOC RAEME in October 2020. Brigadier Allen holds an MBA from Latrobe University. He also holds chartered status as a Certified Practicing Project Director and was recognised as an Engineer Executive by Engineers Australia in 2016. Brigadier Allen is married to Siriporn, and his interests include travelling, jogging and Australian Rules Football.

Introductory Message from our HOC RAEME.

I am extremely honoured to be appointed as your Head of Corps and look forward to representing you and the Corps effectively during my tenure. Whilst I only assumed the role at the end of last year, I have had an initial meeting with the HOC Cell, and we reviewed the key Corps activities for the year.

Obviously, 2020 was an abnormal year due to Covid and most Corps activities were postponed or discarded. I am keen to restore some normality to the Corps functions and activities during 2021.

We will run a Corps Conference later in the year and initial planning has commenced for that and the Craftsman Magazine and, of course, the Corps Port. I note the appointment of the Master Artificers at the end of 2019 and I intend to reenergise this initiative. The COL COMDTs are meeting with me in March 2021 and we will focus on how we foster and strengthen relations across the broader RAEME network of regular Army units and organisations, Army Reserve units and organisations, the various RAEME Associations forming the RAEME National Network, and the HOC cell.

I will provide a more detailed update in the next Spanner News. I hope to conduct some travel with the Corps RSM and visit regional areas during the course of the year. I look forward to hearing any ideas or thoughts you have on the future of the Corps and RAEME matters in general.

RSL - SA and NT 2021 ANZAC Day Update

ANZAC Day is observed annually on April 25th, the anniversary of the Dardanelles Campaign Landing in 1915, and traditionally includes commemorations across the country at dedicated war memorials, community precincts and RSL Sub-Branches.

Adelaide 2021 ANZAC Day CBD Activities are ON

Adelaide Dawn Service

Attendance at the Adelaide Dawn Service will be controlled by numbered bookings and contact tracing records; booking details will be released in early-April and the maximum allowable number of people will be permitted to attend. In the event that people wish to commemorate privately with "Light Up the Dawn" activity a template for conducting a personalised service is included on page 10.

Public health is the prime consideration in this extraordinary time of world-wide COVID-19 health restrictions. Due to the uncertainty of what Covid-19 regulations may apply, limitations are being put in place for some activities. Despite cancellation and restriction of some RSL Sub-Branch and community organisation run ANZAC commemorations, the Adelaide ANZAC Day Committee reinforces that cancellation is not the case in the Adelaide CBD and it is our intent to conduct the RSL Youth Vigil, Dawn Service, March and Service of Remembrance, with limitations to meet Covid-19 requirements.

A booking system, contact tracing records and audience controls will apply at the Adelaide Dawn Service and Service of Remembrance; booking system details will be announced in early-April. SA Police and security personnel will monitor and enforce this. The public are asked to be respectful and cooperative of these requests so as not to jeopardise the commemorations.

Adelaide ANZAC Day March

Subject to Covid-19 regulations, the Adelaide ANZAC Day March will commences at 9.30am from the SA National War Memorial, North Terrace, Adelaide, and moves west, turning right onto King William Road. The march concludes in the streets surrounding the Cross of Sacrifice in Pennington Gardens, North Adelaide.

This year Descendants and Relatives Groups are not permitted to take part due to the larger crowd risk and the requirement for all assembly areas to be used for veterans as a result of increased spacing.

It is important to note that the ANZAC Day March in Adelaide is a commemorative march and not a parade.

ONLY Veterans, ex-service personnel, allies and Australian Defence Force units are able to participate in the 2021 ANZAC Day March and contact tracing records will be required for all marchers. Participants are recommended to load the mySAGOV app onto their smart phones for smooth Covid QR check in. Veterans requiring mobility assistance may have a family member or friend to accompany them.

This year the public are NOT invited to attend as March spectators; only families of Marchers and veterans not marching will be permitted to attend. SA Police and security personnel will enforce this. As usual Adelaide commemorative activities will be broadcast on radio and television by the ABC.

2021 ADELAIDE ANZAC DAY COMMEMORATIVE MARCH STATEMENT OF PRINCIPLES

This year Anzac Day commemorations are affected by Covid-19 regulations regarding distancing, gathering sizes, contact tracing and hygiene. This statement applies in accordance with Covid-19 regulations as of 01/04/21 and is subject to state government and Anzac Day Committee changes at short notice.

The Adelaide Anzac Day Commemorative March is a solemn commemoration of the sacrifice of the nearly 103,000 Australian service personnel who have lost their lives in the service of the nation and is akin to a procession of soldiers to the graveside following a funeral service. The Dawn Service represents the funeral, and the Service of Remembrance at the Cross of Sacrifice that follows the March represents the gathering at the graveside of those that have made the ultimate sacrifice. The Commemorative March is not a "parade" and does not prioritise recognition of the living.

The RSL (SA) State Board entrusts the Anzac Day Committee to be a vigilant custodian of Anzac Day traditions in the City of Adelaide. The Committee maintains and, where appropriate, modifies, the long-established traditions of Anzac Day as it plans and conducts Anzac Day events each year. Anzac Day Marches throughout Australia are organised by different organisations, and not all are guided by similar principles.

As the Anzac Day March is a uniquely Australian and New Zealand commemoration, all serving and former Australian and New Zealand service personnel who have seen warlike or non-warlike operational service are entitled to march. Other serving and former Australian and New Zealand service personnel are authorised to participate in the March.

In a spirit of comradeship, and as a matter of long-standing Anzac Day tradition, those members and former members of foreign armed forces who have personally served alongside Australian forces in a conflict as allies, as members of a coalition that included Australia, or on peacekeeping operations to which Australia has contributed, are invited to participate in the March. Serving or former members of foreign armed forces who have not personally served alongside Australian forces as allies, part of a coalition that included Australia, or on a peacekeeping operation that Australia has contributed to are not authorised to march.

Where a marcher is frail and needs assistance to participate, one or two carers may accompany the marcher according to need.

Traditionally the descendants of deceased veterans who were eligible to march have been permitted to participate in the March within dedicated groups at the rear of the March. It has not been possible to include these groups in the March this year as all assembly areas are required by current and former Australian service personnel and allied personnel due to the physical distancing required by Covid-19 regulations.

The March is organised chronologically, by warlike or non-warlike operational service, conflict, service and where applicable, the seniority of various parts of each service. There are some minor exceptions at the head of the March, based on tradition. There are several additional principles:

- All marchers should be dressed in an appropriate manner; jacket and tie for men, equivalent for women (some serving Australian personnel are required to march in uniform)
- Serving and former Australian service personnel who have seen warlike or non-warlike operational service march ahead of serving or former members of Australian forces who have not seen such service; and
- Contact tracing information will be required from all Marchers.

The general public are not encouraged to attend as spectators in 2021. Immediate family of Marchers, and veterans, ex-service members and allied personnel who are not marching are welcome to attend as spectators but must maintain physical distancing. Thank you for your cooperation and understanding



BEST LAWYER / INSURANCE STORY OF THE YEAR

This took place in Charlotte North Carolina. A lawyer purchased a box of very rare and expensive cigars, then insured them against, among other things, fire.

Within a month, having smoked his entire stockpile of these great cigars, the lawyer filed a claim against the insurance company.

In his claim, the lawyer stated the cigars were lost 'in a series of small fires.'

The insurance company refused to pay, citing the obvious reason, that the man had consumed the cigars in the normal fashion. The lawyer sued and WON!

Delivering the ruling, the judge agreed with the insurance company that the claim was frivolous. The judge stated nevertheless that the lawyer held a policy from the company, in which it had warranted that the cigars were insurable and also guaranteed that it would insure them against fire, without defining what is considered to be unacceptable 'fire' and was obligated to pay the claim.

Rather than endure lengthy and costly appeal process, the insurance company accepted the ruling and paid \$15,000 to the lawyer for his loss of the cigars that perished in the 'fires'.

NOW FOR THE BEST PART...

After the lawyer cashed the check, the insurance company had him arrested on 24 counts of ARSON!!! With his own insurance claim and testimony from the previous case being used against him, the lawyer was convicted of intentionally burning his insured property and was sentenced to 24 months in jail and a \$24,000 fine.

This true story won First Place in last year's Criminal Lawyers Award contest.

He told them "Anybody who fits into my clothes isn't starving!!"

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
