PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Welcome to my report for this edition of the newsletter. I hope everyone is well and survived the winter chills. Since last newsletter there have been a few activities for the association and its members.

Before recapping some events it was with great sadness we heard of the passing of Eddy (Ted) Kaminski. Ted passed away late July and his funeral was held a few weeks later.

Ted was an old school VM Sergeant who prided himself on technical mastery and was uncompromising with quality of work and attention to detail, at times to the point of being a pain in the you know what.

While Ted was long retired, he maintained contact with serving members via the association (Life Member) and was a regular attender of our functions and a great contributor over the years. He was also a great supporter of the Corps Port sales and could be relied upon for many annual purchases when the port arrived.

Having joined the CMF in the early 1960s and working through to the 1980s Ted saw a lot of change and influenced a lot of young tradesman. He was well known for his very extensive workshop manual collection that literally filled his workshop at his home. The collection had manuals of all types of equipment from many countries across the world and in many languages.

Ted was farewelled at a funeral service that was very well represented by RAEME members. LTCOL (Rtd) Greg Rosser provided a great eulogy focussed on the military aspects of Teds life.

A life well lived by a man that was respected by his mates.

The bi-annual luncheon at the Avoca Hotel went well with a small but fun crowd getting together. Well done to those who made the effort to be there and thanks to the organisers.

In recent newsletters we have made mention of the work going on with manufacture and design of a memorial sign to be installed at the gravesite of Craftsman Douglas Borlace. I am very pleased to report that the dedication ceremony was conducted on Saturday 21 September at Stirling Cemetery.

The service was a great event that was attended by about 40 people and included a catafalque party

by students of Sacred Heart College and a dedication by Chaplain Mark Dickens. The catafalque party were dressed in battle dress uniforms of the Vietnam War era with RAEME embellishments and they carried SLRs. Their drill and conduct was excellent and certainly added to the occasion. A huge thank you to Don Harvy who arranged everything to do with the catafalque party from uniforms, weapons, students and the important drill lessons and rehearsals.

Some Military and Personal Memories of Sgt Edward (Ted) Kaminski

by his good friend CAPT (Rtd) John Schulz

It was 1960/1 and there were these 3 young civilians lined up to join the CMF (Citizen Military Forces) at the Jane St Kilkenny Depot of 107 Inf Workshop RAEME. Two were pimply faced 19 - 20 year old's (Watson and Schulz) and the third, Ted, was a stately 28 year old who, we quickly found out, spoke the Queens English with a Polish accent. Well, 3 months on and we graduated from being a "Recruit" to a "Craftsman" and we were posted out to our various Platoons, Ted and Schulz to the Vehicle platoon and Watson to the Q Store. We 3 became firm friends and remained so for the next 60 odd years, although as time marched on, our Military careers were quite different. Ted only served with 107 for a couple of years and was then posted to 3/9 SAMR Regt LAD as a CPL Vehicle mechanic. It was some 5 years later that both Watson and I were also posted to the 3/9 LAD, Watson as the Sgt Storeman and I as the newly minted WO2 ASM. On my first night there, Ted offered to take me for a ride in one of the Regt's MK 1 Ferrets and not having ever experienced riding in one of these vehicles before, I was up for it. Off we went from the Thomas St Unley Depot out onto Unley road and up the Windy Point road and then back to the depot. I had never been so scared in all my life as standing up in the Crew Commander position and flying along at what seemed like 300MPH and going around corners at the same speed, left me shaking and I was so glad to be out of this vehicle and back on solid earth. Ted, on the other hand was very proud that he had scared the sh...t out of his ASM and had a huge grin all over his face. He made the comment along the lines of "did you like the wide boss"?



Still with 3/9 and we were up at the El Alamein camp on a 14-day exercise and during this period, the Regiment had to put on a simulated "Battle Run" for the TV media using Ferrets and Saracens. Well, all was going great guns and for some reason that now escapes me, Ted had been chosen to drive one of the Mk II Ferrets. As the Battle Run progressed with the TV catching all of it on Tape, the Ferret Ted was driving was right in front of the Media stand and the side bin (also the escape hatch) became dislodged and the ferret rear wheels went straight over the bin and trashed it. A huge applause went up from the watching crowds and although it looked spectacular, it was not meant to be part of the display. Ted did spend time doing some voluminous paperwork after the event and as usual, the LAD got another black mark.

On another occasion, we had been out on a weekend exercise supporting the Regt and one of their Saracens broke down and had to be towed back to the Unley depot. The next Tuesday evening the problem was rectified and Ted replaced the "Sun Gears" in each of the 6-wheel stations. (These gears had to be removed for towing purposes when the vehicle was recovered to the Unley depot). Unfortunately, at the time, Ted had not remembered that unlike the Ferret wheel stations, the Saracen sun gears had to be fitted into the epicyclic gear train with the correct timing using the markings provided. As he had finished replacing the gears and, as it was our standard practice to take any repaired vehicle for a test run, off he went and got no further than 300mm when there was this very loud crunching noise coming from each wheel station as the epicyclic gear trains disintegrated. Ted spent another considerable period doing paperwork and there was some "noise" about loss of rank !!

On exercise again and we were headed for the Point Lowly/Cultana Trg area with the Regt strung out along the Pt Augusta Highway. I might add that it was always a huge challenge for the LAD to get all the Regts A Vehicles to any given point. Unfortunately the Ferrets and Saracens in particular, being of English design and manufacture, were not really intended to be used in the hotter climates and as such we always experienced fuel vaporisation and instead of a neat and tidy well-spaced convoy, we had Saracens in particular, spread all along the highway with the crews sitting idly by until we came across them. It was Ted's appointed job to scout ahead of the convoy, stop at service stations and procure bags of ice and then come back down the road and employ our standard fix, which was to pack the fuel lines/filter with ice to attempt to get the vehicle to the next "Ice point" before the ice ran out. Ted was our "Ice Man" and this tag stuck with him over the years. I might add that not all the ice got to the fuel filters, some did end up in the LAD's eskies, oops, I meant food coolers.

Yet another exercise to Cultana and being the LAD, we always travelled at the end of the convoy to pick up the broken down vehicles and so just South of Mambray Creek, I came across a Ferret on the side of the road with its engine cover removed and all I could see of Ted was his rear end sticking in the air. I stopped to find out what was going on and to lend a hand if required and asked Ted what was wrong. I digress slightly here as it is necessary to explain that Ted was a stickler for correct mechanical protocols and if a vehicle had reached its mileage service point, then it had to be serviced etc. Well, this ferret had not reached its required service point but had actually burnt an exhaust valve seat, according to Teds diagnosis. As this was detrimental to its operation, Ted was in the process of removing the head to confirm this diagnosis and carry out a repair. I was a little astounded as to carry out this type of repair, you really had to be inside a fully kitted out workshop. On questioning Ted further, he was not at all phased and just said that it may be a couple of days before he got the vehicle into camp. In the end, we agreed to have the Recovery Vehicle take the Ferret in tow.



Ted's Landrover (ex-Military) – it was his personal prize and treasure and he must have spent many man years stripping it down to a bare chassis and then rebuilding it back to its pristine new condition. I might add that it probably weighed twice as much as a new vehicle as Ted liked to add features which enhanced, in Teds opinion, the performance attributes of the vehicle, for example, the diffs and gear boxes come with standard "Breathers" and this was not adequate for Ted and he had breathers on breathers on breathers – just in case. He also was designing a hydraulic system which would be driven off the PTO on the Landrover and which could then hydraulically drive the wheels of his half ton trailer. It was always a talking point when we all got together – Ted, how is your Landrover going and is it on the road yet ? And the response – still working on it !!

On a more personal point, none of us will ever know or experience what Ted went through in his home county of Poland prior to him getting out and migrating to OZ. Unfortunately, Ted was always looking over his shoulder should the Secret Police be watching him and this never went away and was present from the day I first met him right up until he past. He was always very secretive about what he was doing however he was a good friend, mate and colleague. I am not entirely sure of my facts here and I am not sure when this occurred, but it did, Ted sent his sister who still lived in Poland, half of a dollar note so that when he visited her, they could fit the two halves together so that he could be sure that he was actually identifying his sister.

Ted the collector, he must have had the biggest collection of Workshop manuals in the Southern Hemisphere and right up until the end, he was still collecting them.

Rest easy Mate, the Secret Police can no longer touch you.

42809 CFN DOUGLAS GRAHAM BORLACE

KIA 15th July 1968

Douglas Borlace grew up in the Adelaide Hills in Bridgewater and went to Oakbank Area School. He joined the Army and started recruit training in 1962. After 3 years with Armoured Corp he transferred to RAEME and trained as a Vehicle Mechanic. In June 1968 he was sent to South Vietnam and posted to 3rd Cavalry Regiment Light Aid Detachment. On 15 July 1968, 5 days after his 24th birthday, Doug was travelling on one of the APCs when it hit a land mine. He was killed and became the first RAEME Soldier to be killed in action in Vietnam. His body was returned to Australia and was buried in the Stirling Cemetery on 25 July 1968 (Gravesite 27A). There was no indication Doug was Killed in Action until 2003 (the 35th Anniversary) when our Association, with the permission of the family, arranged for the installation of an additional Bronze "Remembrance Plaque" that explained Doug was actually Killed in Action.

In early 2018 (the 50th Anniversary of Doug's Death) Bob Killoran, one of our Association Executive Committee, suggested it would be fitting if we did something to remember the occasion.

After some discussion, viewing the gravesite and checking with the council and family it was decided we should look at installing an Information Sign (similar to an existing one in the cemetery for a VC winner so he is in good company).

Unfortunately getting permission and the manufacture organised was not possible in 2018 so the all-important Dedication Service took place on Saturday 21st September 2019.

The DEDICATION SERVICE

About 50 people attended the service, in cold, wet and windy conditions (with a short patch of sunshine during the significant part of the service). The attendees included Assn members, some of Doug's family, his school friends and other locals who were all keen participants.


